Dear Members of the Good Shepherd Community

By the time you read this letter Ruth and I will have been warmly welcomed by everyone we have met at worship or on other occasions, and we are looking forward to a very meaningful relationship with this congregation and its ministry. Of course because we are right the heart of the summer vacation time, it is understandable that there are some people we will be meeting for the first time following the Labor Day weekend, when, for the most part, everyone will be back to school, back to work, and back to church.

My primary purpose the past few weeks has been to learn about you. This has meant a lot of time spent with the membership roll, the Parish Register, and most importantly, making personal contact with people either through home visitations (for which I wish there had been more) and numerous phone calls. All of this has helped make the connection of names and faces, but more importantly to learn a bit about you as individuals.

Ruth and I are also planning to conduct a six- week course starting on September 14 – *Managing Stress: Seeking Serenity for the Soul* on Tuesday afternoons at 1:00 and evenings at 7:00. The deadline to sign up is August 29th as the books must be ordered. I am sure there will be other important programs to be developed as the months ahead unfold. I can better tell you about that after meeting with the Church Council and discussing how we can effectively minister both within the congregation and in the community.

In conclusion I want all of you to prioritize on your calendars Sunday, September 12. Whether you are a faithful weekly worshipper or you worship occasionally or you haven't been to worship in months, please plan to come together as the whole Good Shepherd Community. THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER by Gil Vatter

My watch says it's 11:03 pm and I just returned from a meeting of the Zoning Board at Holmdel Township Town Hall. The Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd was #4 on the agenda and I am going to use the "President's Corner" to explain to you what happened and why our church had to appear before the Holmdel Township Zoning Board.

Back in March of this year, I was contacted by the owners of the Little Chief Learning Station, who were interested in moving one of their two pre-school operations from the Lincroft Presbyterian Church to our church. They had heard good things about our pre-school facility, that it was vacant and because they had been advised that their rent at the Presbyterian Church would increase by 47% in September, which would put their second location out of business. I met with the Council and we began intensive study and negotiations with JoAnn Hickman and Jean Marie McCann of Little Chief.

By June 1, I had prepared the first draft of a "letter of agreement", which was reviewed by the Council and a number of changes and additions were made. The second draft was finished by June 15 and by June 29 the final draft agreement was signed by the Little Chief people and by me as president of the Council. We were ready for Little Chief to move in. At Steve Miller's direction, various members of the congregation began repairs and improvements to the pre-school area. JoAnn and Jean were cleaning and dusting. Everything seemed to be moving along smoothly.

However, I received a frantic e-mail from JoAnn Hickman on July 9, telling me that Holmdel Township Zoning Board had denied the necessary permits to Little Chief to move into Good Shepherd because a "private entity is not permitted to run a pre-school in your facility". I met with the Secretary of the Zoning Board the next day and she recommended that we hire a lawyer and appear before the Zoning Board if we wanted to have a non-church organization run a pre-school in our building.

I contacted Michael Bruno from the firm of Giordano, Halleran & Ciesla who has appeared before the Holmdel Board in the past and he agreed to represent us. I was required to send G. H. & C. a retainer check for \$1,000 as well as a \$1,000 check for Beacon Planning and Consulting Services, who would also represent us before the Board.

After considerable preparation, we appeared before the Board on Wednesday night August 10 and, despite our attorney's pleas, they insisted that they (the Board) must abide by a resolution dated April 10, 1991, which stated that only Good Shepherd could manage a pre-school on its property. They concluded that the only way to change the 1991 resolution was through a "use variance" request. We were totally frustrated.

The day following the meeting, I met with the Zoning Board secretary and signed the necessary paperwork to have Good Shepherd appear on the agenda of the Zoning Board meeting of August 25 so our attorney could request a "use variance", our only choice. The following day I gave Holmdel Township a \$500 "fee" check and a \$1,000 "escrow" check, in order to get us on the agenda for the 25th. Nothing is cheap.

Tonight, August 25, after a brief but fruitless review of our contention that we should be able to have a pre-school on our premises, no matter who runs it, Mr. Bruno was permitted to call witnesses who had not been allowed to testify at the August 10 meeting. Mr. Andrew Janiw of Beacon Planning did a splendid job of reviewing the planning portion of our case. I testified that our church has been a member of the Holmdel

community since 1967 and that we have served the community with a pre-school since 1987, when TLC began using our building. JoAnn Hickman ended the testimony with an outline of the Little Chief curriculum and a short explanation of the staff, schedule and daily routine. Pastor Jack also made a brief statement.

After a prolonged discussion by the Board and a closing statement by our attorney, the Board finally voted unanimously to grant us a use variance. Little Chief will be permitted to operate a school at Good Shepherd.

I wanted to tell you all about this business with Holmdel because it has taken a tremendous amount of time and effort for me and for members of the Council to shepherd this program from a March inquiry to what will soon be a September school opening. It not only has been a lot of work, it has cost us \$3,500, so far. It may cost more. We have been successful in clearing up the matter with Holmdel but it has been a distracting problem and many of us have been working on this project rather than other matters in the parish. I must say, it also perfectly describes the red tape and frustration encountered when we, a church, must go to our local government for help. With any luck, we won't have to do that ever again.

MANAGING STRESS –*Seeking Serenity for the Soul*

That's the title of one of the the most popular and well-received courses provided by the ELCA's Augsburg Fortress. Pastor and Ruth Elstad will be offering the six-session program on Tuesday afternoons and evenings September 14 – October 19 at 1 pm and 7 pm. Each session is 90 minutes and enrollment is limited to no more than 20 persons. Those attending are encouraged to invite their friends to attend as well.

As the introduction to course book states. . . “We live in an age of stress. In fact, many people today believe that life is just one stressful thing after another. Some even say life has become a battle of survival in a war of conflicting commitments. This study assumes that life is a gift from God to be enjoyed, embraced, and expressed in satisfying service. God sets a preferred path before us, a way of peace, inviting us to leave joyless, tired, frazzled ways and to come live an abundant life born of the serenity of the soul. This study will examine some of the root spiritual causes of current widespread frustration and fatigue. Moreover it will teach biblically-based, spiritual responses to stress that can lead to growing and enduring peace. The soul centered in Christ rests in grace, lets go of the driven pursuits of the ego, and finds deep joy in a sane and genuinely fulfilling daily life.”
